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120th Final, not the 147th Final?

It is customary for us to look back at the outcome of the Glasgow Celtic Society from 50 years ago within our match programme, however in 1975 along with the Torlundy Cup that year the competition was held in abeyance.

You might ask, why is this the 120th Final of a competition which was first played in 1879?

Should it not be the 147th cup final? What got in the way?

World War 1?

The Glasgow Celtic Society Cup Final was played in 1914, with Furnace eventually defeating Glasgow Skye 3 – 2 in a replay following a 4 – 4 draw in the Final but was then suspended during the war years.

The competition was next played in 1920 with Kyles Athletic defeating Glasgow Skye 5 – 1.

World War 2?

The final was played in 1939, with Kyles Athletic defeating Glasgow Mid Argyll 1 – 0 in a replay following a 2 – 2 draw in the final, the competition was then suspended during the war years.

The competition was next played in 1947 with Oban Camanachd defeating Glasgow Inverness-shire 8 – 1.

Covid 19?

In the modern era it wasn't a World War that impacted the annual Shinty calendar but a Global Pandemic!!

Thankfully the effect of Covid 19 lasted only one year, with the 2020 final along with all other major sporting events being cancelled.

But these only account for 13 years?.....

In the early years as in 1975 there were years missed for various reasons; however and most significantly the cup final was not played for a period of 12 years!

An unresolved dispute about whether or not the ball had gone over the bye line before Furnace scored a goal against Inveraray in a first round tie in 1888, which eventually resulted in court action leading to the competition being suspended for a total of 12 years. This in 1899 led to the Directors of the Glasgow Celtic Society taking direct control of the competition, a situation which exists to this day.

Shinty is most definitely a unique sport!!

50 Years ago, the 1975 Final that never was....

In 1974 the cup final was moved from its original date to avoid a clash with the live televising of the Scotland Football Team's World Cup match with Yugoslavia, and due to the non-availability of any suitable pitches to play the final in Glasgow on the new date the cup final was moved to Strachur.

In the next year, 1975, the same two teams qualified again, and both teams requested that the final to be played in Argyll once more, or if it was to be played in Glasgow that all the travel and meals expenses of the teams be borne by the Society.

The result of which was a problem for the Directors of the Society, who had acted against their own constitution the previous year by holding the final outwith the city. The Directors wrote to the clubs reaffirming Glasgow as the venue and that the Society could not undertake to meet the expenses of the participants. To allow the preparations for the final to proceed, written confirmation that they were "agreeable to playing in Glasgow on the above conditions" was requested by 14th May.

Neither club replied by the stipulated date – and indeed neither had the courtesy to reply at all – and the cup was withdrawn for that year.

When the invitations were sent to the clubs for the 1975 – 1976 competition, the rules, as laid down in the constitution of the society were reiterated, needless to say the competition proceeded smoothly.

- 1 Cammy Sutherland (25) – Architectural Engineer - Goalkeeper**
A highly committed player who travels from Ballachulish for training and games. Cammy is undoubtedly one of the best goalkeepers in the game and has also taken on the role of Under-14s manager this season.
- 2 Daniel Madej (30) – IT Analyst - Defender**
Vice-captain and one of our most consistent performers over several seasons. A great reader of the game and a fantastic stick player.
- 3 Alexander Macdonald (18) – Farm Hand (Student) - Defender**
After years on the fringes of the first team, Alex has fully emerged this season, starting every game thanks to his matured and skilled performances.

A driving force on and off the park, Garry is a natural leader who sets the highest standards for the team. A clean hitter and fantastic striker of the ball, he's a crucial presence in the midfield.
- 7 Lorne Dickie (34) – Electrician - Midfielder**
A masterstroke by Daniel to bring Lorne back this season—widely regarded as one of the best technical players in the game. A superb mentor for younger players.
- 8 Evan MacLellan (26) – Bricklayer - Midfielder**
"Big Ev" has delivered consistently strong performances in the centre this season. Despite a fractured cheekbone, his rapid recovery and elite fitness levels ensured he quickly returned to the squad.
- 9 Daniel MacVicar (26) – Electrician - Forward**
Captain this year, leading by example in matches and training. He had a stellar 2024, sharing the Club Player of the Year award with Andy and earning a well-deserved Scotland call-up.
- 10 Ross Campbell (21) – Electrician - Forward**
"Bobo" has been outstanding this year, benefiting from a strong pre-season and maintaining top form ever since. Extremely fit and fast, with excellent dribbling and shooting ability.

11 Malcolm Clark (30) – Plumber - Forward
Injuries have made his season stop-start, but now fully fit, he is a vital asset. He has played at senior level for nearly 15 years, providing invaluable experience to the younger players. Scored twice as captain in last year's final victory.

12 Ross MacMillan (26) – Groundworker - Forward

A prolific scorer, Ross has averaged nearly a goal per game this season. A big-game player who thrives under pressure—while he didn't score in last year's final, he played a decisive role in all three goals.

13 Callum Macmillan (19) – Apprentice Plumber - Defender

Callum "Digger" has been on the verge of the senior team for a while. He stepped up in last year's final, coming on early and performing well. As captain, he led Lochside Rovers to league and cup success last season.

14 Craig Macmillan (24) Groundworker - Forward

A hugely popular figure in the squad, "Crago" is the heartbeat of the changing room, keeping spirits high. A dedicated trainer who holds himself to the highest standards, he boasts a superb first touch and a fierce strike that keeps defenders on edge.

15 Gregor Macdonald (21) – Student - Midfielder

Gregor missed the first quarter of the season due to work and study commitments but effortlessly rejoined the squad, thanks to his fitness and high skill level.

16 Scott Campbell (16) Student - Midfield/Forward

It's remarkable that Scott is only 16, as his maturity on the field far exceeds his years. He thrives on the physical side of the game and is a powerful hitter on both hands. Versatile in his play, he has stepped into the centre line at times this season.

17 Joe MacVicar - (18) Cemetery Worker -Midfielder/Forward

Another hugely popular squad member, Joe's enthusiasm for shinty is boundless—he's happy as long as he's playing. With his fantastic attitude and natural talent, there's no doubt he will develop into a top shinty player, following in the footsteps of many Oban MacVicar's before him.

18 Daniel Maccuish (25) – Plumber - Defender/ Midfielder

A strong tackler and exceptional stick player. Daniel started the season well at half-back before injuries disrupted his momentum. It's a huge boost for the team to have him back in action.

19 Scott Macmillan - (36) Groundworker - Midfielder/Forward

"Melon" Scott brings 18 years of senior team experience to the field. Over the years, he's gradually moved further up the park, where he continues to pose a serious goal-scoring threat.

 A defender who transitioned to goalkeeper seven years ago due to injury, Iain has had a superb start to life in the Premiership as Kyles' No.1. He joined Kyles this season from Oban Celtic and is making his first senior final appearance.
- 2 Murdo Macrae – 22 – Defender – Farmer**
 This season's captain, Murdo is a formidable defender, renowned for his long reach and powerful hitting. He continues to grow in confidence each year. Cousin of Ross Macrae, he makes the journey from the Edinburgh area for games.
- 3 Cameron Jack – 27 – Defender – Naval Architect**
 Cammy continues to develop his skills in defense and has also played a significant part of the season in midfield, showcasing his big hitting and excellent blocking. He will be hoping to add a second Celtic Cup winner's medal to his honours.
- 4 Somhairlie Thomson – 22 – Defender – Tree Surgeon**
 Somhairlie is a terrier in defense, known for his speed and agility. Having made the move from Newtonmore, he has settled exceptionally well into life at Kyles. He is also fluent in Gaelic!
- 5 Innes Macdonald – 30 – Midfielder – Joiner**
 'Big Red' recently missed a few weeks due to injury but has been a stalwart in the midfield this season. Strong and with a long reach, he perfectly complements the centre line. He is the younger brother of Roddy.
- 6 Roddy Macdonald – 37 – Defender – Workshop Supervisor (Fire & Rescue Service)**
 Skilful and passionate, Roddy has been a rock in defense this year, providing an experienced head and a calming influence on the team. He has won all major trophies and is a former Internationalist.
- 7 Will Cowie – 28 – Forward – CA Development Officer**
 Since joining Kyles after his move from Skye, Will has proven to be a tremendous asset to the Kyles forward line with his clever passing play. Recovering from an early-season injury, Will is eager to win his first Celtic Cup medal. An U21 Internationalist, he also boasts two Balliemore and three National Division winner's medals.
- 8 James Pringle – 27 – Forward – Civil Engineer**
 Also hailing from the Isle of Skye, but now based in Edinburgh, James is enhancing the forward line with his well-positioned play, incisive passing, and excellent finishing ability. He is the side's top goal scorer across all competitions this year.

- 9 Scott Macdonald – 26 – Forward – Plasterer**
Scott will work tirelessly in the forward line, possessing an excellent engine and an impressive ability to drive at defenses. His skillful stick work and unwavering determination make Scott a handful for any defender. He is a cousin of Roddy and Innes.
- 10 Ross Macrae – 27 – Forward – Farmer**
Ross will be hoping to add to his honours with a fourth Celtic Cup triumph. He is the team's centre, displaying excellent stick work and consistently giving his all for the team. He is returning from an injury sustained in the 5-0 quarter-final win against Col Glen.
- 11 Roan McVicar – 17 – Forward – Student**
Our youngest player, Roan gives his all on the pitch with his speed and agility and is visibly growing in confidence within the first team this year. Roan has provided some crucial goals this season in a number of games. He was part of the junior team's Bullough Cup-winning side a couple of years ago and will be hoping to add a Celtic Cup winner's medal to that achievement.
- 12 Luke Thornton – 25 – Forward – Mechanic**
Luke was part of the Junior side who won the Bullough Cup a couple of years ago. Possessing a powerful swing and significant strength, he will be hoping to hit the target for Kyles in this Celtic Cup Final.
- 13 Ross Donald – 20 – Midfielder – Student**
In his first full season at senior level, Ross has played a key part in the midfield this season. After winning two Bullough Cups with the Juniors, he is now looking to make a significant mark in the first team.
- 14 Max Carr – 27 – Defender - Product Consultant**
A previous Sutherland Cup and Bullough Cup winner, Max is looking to add the Celtic Cup to his collection after moving up from the Juniors this season.
- 15 Liam Arnott - 25 - Midfielder – Bartender**
Having come down from Lochcarron, he made an impact in the Juniors, winning the Bullough Cup in 2021. This is his first season back after being away in the States, and he is looking to win his first piece of silverware with the Kyles senior team.

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Who are the Glasgow Celtic Society.....

The Glasgow Celtic Society was constituted on 5th February 1857 with a membership of 527. The objects were the preservation of the language, literature, music, poetry, antiquities, and athletic games of the Highlanders of Scotland, the encouragement of the more general use of the Highland garb and the establishment of a fund for affording temporary relief to deserving and destitute Highlanders in Glasgow. Later a third object was added, to found bursaries or make annual or other grants of money in aid of diligent or distinguished students, natives or sons of natives of the Highlands of Scotland.



At their first AGM plans were made to hold a Gathering later in the year. This was to be on the 6th and 7th of August in the College Park. Details of the competitions and rules appeared in the Glasgow Herald on 7th July. The advertisement was headed by a list of the patrons, beginning with the Dukes of Atholl, Argyll and Montrose followed by the Earls of Elgin, Perth and Seafield, then various other noblemen, Clan Chiefs and landed gentlemen.

The modern history of the Society is centred upon the game of shinty and its preservation within the Glasgow and the South.

The Society supports youth shinty and its connections with the Gaelic Language as well as Gaelic culture through the National Mod and during the dark days of Covid in 2020 supported a special Shinty Composition Competition in partnership with the Royal Celtic Society and the Camanachd Association.



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Jack Asher Memorial Whistle

Since 2016, this whistle has been presented to the referee of the Glasgow Celtic Society's Cup final in memory of Jack Asher, who was associated with the Society for over 50 years - as a Director, as President from 1981 - 2000 and as Chieftain from 2000 until his death in 2015, aged 88 years.

Brought up in Nethy Bridge, Jack played shinty from an early age and, despite the loss of an eye as a youngster, played the game to a very high standard, being awarded a 'Blue' by Glasgow University where he was a member of the team which won the Southern League in 1960. He also gained a 'Blue' for Judo and was in the University team which won the British University Championship around that time. In 1964, he helped to found Kelvin Shinty Club - a club for former students of all Scottish Universities. A serious illness, resulting in the loss of a lung, curtailed his involvement as a player, but he did turn out for Kelvin on a number of occasions until 1970.

Long before his playing days were over, Jack was called upon to referee and officiated at his first Glasgow Celtic Society Cup final in 1962. He was 'the man in the middle' at two other finals, including the Centenary final of 1979. He was also in charge of three Camanachd Cup finals.

He was a prominent member of the Referees' Association and a supporter of Schools' and Women's shinty. In 1999, he was honoured by the Camanachd Association with the Marine Harvest Award for services to shinty - the first recipient of this award. Another accolade came in 2008 when Glasgow University honoured him with a testimonial match and a presentation caman.

The Directors of the Society considered that the presentation of a 'Jack Asher Memorial Whistle' to the referee of their Cup final would be a fitting reminder of his contribution to the Society and to shinty.

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Donnie MacNiven Memorial Medal

Like all minority sports in Scotland, Shinty requires the input of enthusiastic volunteers and none has made a greater contribution to the sport than Donnie MacNiven.

Donnie arrived in Glasgow from Kames in the early 50's having been steeped in shinty during his childhood in Tighnabruich and made his playing debut for his beloved Glasgow Mid Argyll in 1955 and he later became team manager in 1972, leading them to victory in the 1973 Camanachd Cup Final.

His managerial careers saw him coach the Scotland International team versus Ireland for four years in the 1970's.

Donnie served on the Camanachd Association Executive and was a Director of the Glasgow Celtic Society. His efforts for the sport of shinty were recognised in 2009 when he received the Camanachd Association's Millenium Award for outstanding contribution to the sport and in the same year he received the Sports Council of Glasgow's 30 Year Voluntary Contribution to Sport Award. In 2008 he received the Marine Harvest Special Service Award.

For someone who participated and held virtually every position within the sport he is an example and inspiration to us all in his promotion of fairness, discipline, and honesty.

In our opinion all shinty players are brave heroes!! However, it is important to reflect on some of the names from the past, and whilst not a shinty player who ever competed in our competition here's one of significant note.

Dr Johnnie Cattanaich (1885–1915) – thought by many to be the greatest shinty player of all time.

The youngest of four children, he was educated at Newtonmore and Kingussie Public Schools, George Watson's College, and Edinburgh University.

Dr Cattanaich a qualified medic, graduated from the University of Edinburgh in 1912 and serving in the Royal Army Medical Corps, Warwickshire Regiment. After becoming a Lieutenant in 1914, he died the following year, succumbing to wounds sustained in the Dardanelles during World War I.

He showed exceptional sporting promise from a young age and soon became renowned for his natural ability, superb physique and a scientific approach to shinty.

He trained for hour after hour, darting round larch trees and catching the ball before it touched the ground. On his way to play on the local field, he was said to run nearly a mile without letting the ball touch the ground.

This peerless skill won him fame throughout the Highlands and he became a tower of strength to the Newtonmore team, which he captained in a victorious season during a vintage period in the club's history. His most spectacular individual performance came in the 1909 Camanachd Cup Final in Glasgow, where he scored eight goals in an 11-3 victory over Furnace – a record that still stands to this day.

He was also capped for Scotland at hockey and athletics, where he excelled in sprinting and the long jump.

Dr Cattanach was the only shinty player inducted into Scotland's Sporting Hall of Fame until the induction of Ronald (Ronaldo of the Glens) Ross in 2023.

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The Scottish Sea Farms MacQuisten Cup Final 2025

Prior to today's Scottish Sea Farms Glasgow Celtic Society Challenge Cup Final, we also hosting MacQuisten Cup Final, the prime cup competition for Under 17's in the South.

This year's final again sees holders Glasgow Mid Argyll take on Oban Camanachd.

The winners of this trophy each year can call themselves the south of Scotland under-17 shinty champions.

The MacQuisten Cup has been contested in the sport since 1927 and for a number of years it has been played for at under-17 level. The trophy was presented to the sport, by Fred MacQuisten, who was MP for Argyllshire, as it was, in the years up to the Second World War.

Frederick Alexander McQuisten MP, the son of Reverend Dr Alexander MacQuisten, minister of Inverkip Parish Church, and became an advocate and barrister-at-law.

He was Scottish Conservative and Unionist MP for Springburn in Glasgow between 1918 and 1922, then Argyllshire from 1924 until his death aged 69 on February 29, 1940, at his home at Walton-on-Thames, Surrey.

Mr MacQuisten is said to have been well-known in the House of Commons for his wit. Aside from some more controversial initiatives he introduced a Private Member's Bill in his own words, to 'restore the individual freedom of the working man'. The Bill was eventually introduced following the general strike in 1926.

He also sang the praises of herring, porridge and Scotch whisky.

Perhaps his support of shinty had something to do with this view of Scotland – or perhaps it was because his predecessor in the Argyllshire constituency, Liberal MP Sir William Sutherland, had himself presented the sport with a now-famous trophy years earlier.

The MacQuisten Cup remains the principal competition for Under 17's in the south of Scotland and we look forward to a closely contested match between both teams today.

Shinty War hero ‘Ginger’ - the Gaelic Great Escape

As the nation looks back on the 80th anniversary of VE day, here’s one of many stories involving the bravery of shinty players and the sport’s unbreakable bonds with the Gaelic language.

North Ballachulish man, James ‘Ginger’ Wilson, 81, hit the headlines in August 1940, after he and two other members of the 8th (The Argyllshire) Battalion Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders who were decorated with the Distinguished Conduct Medal, after the war, escaped from the clutches of the Germans.

‘Ginger’, as he was fondly known because of his flaming red hair, and his friends, Alistair MacDonald, and Willie Kemp, of Glencoe, were captured by the enemy on June 7, 1940. The quick-thinking threesome made good their escape by speaking in their mother tongue – a language which fooled the Germans into thinking they were Russians. ‘If it wasn’t for Gaelic, I wouldn’t be alive today,’ pointed out the ex-Nether Lochaber and Fort William shinty player.

Two companies of the 8th Argylls, along with a platoon of the Norfolks, were surrounded by the Germans in France on June 3. They held out for four days but were taken prisoner on June 7.

Recounting his story, Ginger said ‘The Argylls were marched in a procession, consisting of about 5,000 prisoners, towards Lille. Horrified to think of the fate that lay in store, ‘Ginger’, Alistair and Willie concocted a plan to escape’.

‘When we were taken prisoner, we knew that we would have to escape in order to survive. So, one day we managed to walk away from the procession very quietly, and we hid behind a tree. There were thousands of people being marched, and the line stretched for four or five miles. We didn’t dare move until everyone was out of sight.’

Clad in stolen civilian clothing, the trio made off cross country, heading for Spain.



‘We slept under the stars and we ate anything, like turnips, raw potatoes, and berries, to survive. One day I shot a cow, which he had great delight in eating. We also stole chickens from farms’.

‘The days were long, but we managed to keep our spirits high by singing Gaelic songs’.

Eventually, they reached Spain, and the lads tracked down a British Consul, who arranged transport to take them back in Scotland. They landed on British soil on July 30.

‘It is a day I’ll never forget, when I actually came home to Ballachulish. There was a time when I thought I would never see my village again,’ added ‘Ginger’, who was discharged from the army on his return home. ‘It’s all history now, but I think it’s very important for people to realise that it was the Gaelic that helped us survive. In order for the language to survive, children should be taught their mother tongue at an early age.’



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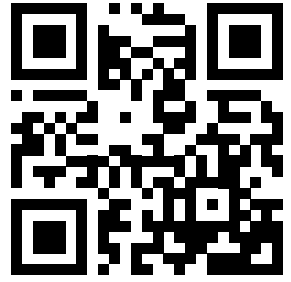


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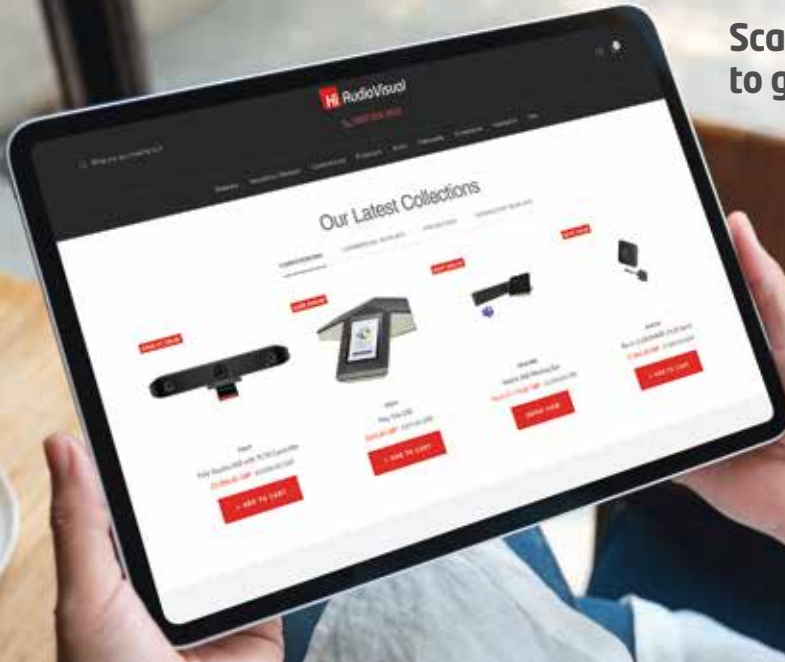
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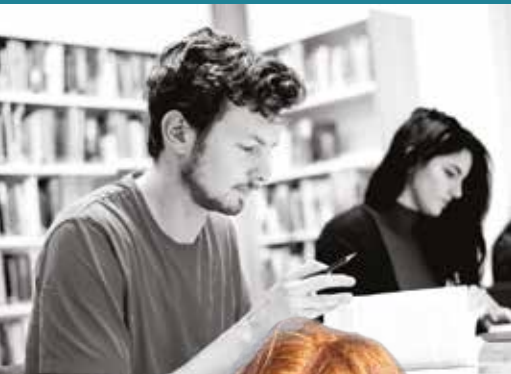
