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

PRESIDENT'S INTRODUCTION 2022 YEARBOOK

It's been another whirlwind year and I'm proud to say much has been achieved as we aimed for our first full season following the COVID pandemic. Our key aim was to deliver a full league season for our sponsors, MOWI, and on behalf of the Board I would like to record my thanks to our member clubs and staff for making this happen. I should also congratulate the league winners – Kingussie, Skye, Col Glen, Newtonmore, Bute and Beauly – well done to you all!

It would also be remiss of me not to note that season 2022 was Kingussie's year, with the MOWI Premier League, Tulloch Homes Camanachd Cup, cottages.com MacTavish Cup and the Artemis Macaulay Cup all making their way to the Dell. Newtonmore also remained the club to beat at junior level by winning every competition they entered and securing the Highland Industrial Supplies Sutherland Cup, Strathdearn Cup and MOWI North Division 1 for their trophy cabinet.

Other notable cup successes were Beauly winning the Ferguson Transport and Shipping Balliemore Cup after being losing finalists in 2021; Col Glen lifting the inaugural Single Team Club Competition in a closely contested final against Glengarry; and Glasgow Mid Argyll securing a South area cup double as their first team emerged victorious in the Glasgow Celtic Society Cup and their second team secured the MKM Building Supplies Oban Bullough Cup.

Improving safety in our sport is something the Board are determined to deliver. Two Bauer ice-hockey helmets have been approved by the Board affording players more choice and greater protection. In addition, the proposal to raise the mandatory age for wearing a helmet and faceguard to under-21 for season 2023 was approved at the AGM. Of course, I must acknowledge that the proposals to make helmets and faceguards mandatory for all players in season 2023 did not achieve the required 75% majority of voting members but it is worth recognising that it achieved 34 votes in favour and fell only two votes short of the number required.

Season 2022 also delivered a few firsts. We held out first hybrid AGM with members offered the choice to attend in person or online. This proved successful and will be repeated in season 2023. The venue for the AGM was the Highland Cinema in Fort William and this was also the location for the 2022 MOWI Awards. The venue and this set-up provided for a more informal approach, with the Awards held in the auditorium followed by a buffet in the restaurant to allow the award winners the chance to mingle. The redevelopment of the Bught Park took a major step forward with funding confirmed and plans for an interactive experience called Shinty's Story being worked up. Last, but not least, and the Final Fling saw a music concert follow the Camanachd Cup for the first time. My congratulations to Kingussie on this innovation. A tremendous example of community involvement and one we will review to see what can be learned for the future.

INNOVATIVE MENTAL HEALTH SPONSORSHIP AGREED

The Camanachd Association have struck an innovative deal with Scottish Counselling Services that will allow all of its member clubs access to 6 counselling sessions per year, free of charge.

The introduction of this new partner furthers the Association's widespread approach to supporting mental health across the country. This partnership will add to the initiatives that are already underway in the Highlands with Mikeysline; Argyll & Bute with the Samaritans and Lochaber with Scottish Association for Mental Health. In addition to this 12 clubs have joined the Shinty Chaplaincy programme and have direct support embedded within their club structure.

Derek Keir, Camanachd Association CEO, revealed: "We are delighted to agree a sponsorship deal with Scottish Counselling Services with an in-kind contribution delivering for all of our clubs, right across the country. We are all too aware that the full effects of the pandemic are yet to be felt, and combined with the cost-of-living crisis this counselling support could be invaluable to our members.

We are proud to continue to offer unique initiatives, as well as the opportunity to reap the benefits of sport and exercise, in order to create more mentally healthy communities across the country."

Harriet Inglis, Scottish Counselling Services said: 'We are delighted to be able to work with the Camanachd Association in offering all of its member clubs access to counselling. Our main aim and ethos at Scottish Counselling Services is to make counselling as accessible to as many as possible, and we are so pleased to be able to provide this to the wider shinty community'

Participation in the senior leagues increased from 52 teams in 2019 to 54 in 2022 with Strachur joining forces with Dunoon and playing as Strachur - Dunoon and Uddingston entering the leagues for the first time.

New clubs starting were supported in a variety of ways including East Lothian, Stirling, Perth, Nairn and Uddingston with a wide variety of taster sessions and support being provided to existing and new shinty playing communities.



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ADDITIONS TO BOARD AND STAFF STRENGTHEN CAMANACHD ASSOCIATION

Former Lovat stalwart John MacRitchie is the newest member of the Camanachd Association Board of Directors. John has already shown a desire to grow and improve the game with a focus on ensuring that young people stick with shinty as they grow older and encouraging as many as possible to take up the sport and progress through the pathway to senior level. Professionally, John has worked with the public for 38 years as a Business Relationship manager for the Royal Bank of Scotland. From a shinty perspective, John has played since his youth, having first played at Tomnacross and then Lovat for 30 years of first team shinty. He was treasurer when Lovat had their centenary year and John also filled other major roles at the club including Secretary and more recently was elected President in 2014. Further engagement with shinty has come through an active role with the Camanachd Association Competitions Committee and as a regular match official.

The Camanachd Association were sad to lose the expertise of Youth Director, Willie MacDonald at the 2022 AGM as he served his 2nd consecutive term on the Board and therefore had to step off for a period in line with the organisation's governance laws. That disappointment was remedied by the re-election of Roddy McCuish and Burton Morrison, two men steeped in the history of the game.

The Camanachd Association staff also received a boost in 2022 as three new members of staff joined to take the team to 10. Firstly, Roddy Young has been hired to the role of Regional Development Officer (Central) which will be based mostly across the central belt. The post has the focus of supporting clubs in the area to become stronger, creating new opportunities to engage the wider community and, importantly, to provide organised and high-quality experiences in shinty for new communities. Roddy said:

"It's been a whirlwind first year at the Camanachd Association, until you join it's hard to grasp the magnitude of work that is undertaken to ensure that games and competitions happen across Scotland! I have really enjoyed my first year and I must thank the dedicated volunteers I work with across the central region who enable our sport to thrive."

The Camanachd Association's partnership work with Bòrd Na Gàidhlig enabled them to recruit a Gaelic Language Shinty Development Officer on the Isle of Skye. Thereby, in December 2022, Ruth Gordon was also welcomed to the team in a new exciting role. Speaking of this, she said: "After just recently becoming involved with the Camanachd Association, I have very quickly come to the realisation that it is such a hardworking and driven team to be a part of. It is a privilege to be able to work within the organisation, making sure shinty and it's culture remains alive throughout the next generations. Working with Bord Na Gàidhlig is also an absolute pleasure. As a fluent Gàidhlig speaker, being able to engage with youngsters and increase their participation through the language is a brilliant way to help keep it alive. I'm extremely excited for the year ahead and increasing the involvement of youngsters within our sport."

Finally, Alison Thompson was recruited to the role of Regional Development Officer East and was a great addition to the team. Alison left at the end of 2022 to pursue other interests but, her work with Lochaber based clubs and the SAMH "Gain the Advantage" program will have a long lasting legacy.





LEAGUE WINNERS

Kingussie are crowned Mowi Premiership Champions again

Kingussie wrapped up the league campaign with a 0-0 draw at Balgate on the final day of the season, this was the final piece of the Grand Slam jigsaw adding to the MacTavish Cup, Macaulay Cup and Camanachd Cup victories that you can read about later in this publication...

A 0-0 stalemate in November was the way that the season ended for Kingussie, not a very fitting tribute to a side that led the table from Matchday 1. While that particular game may not have made the end of season highlight reel, it did mark an historic day in the club's history, securing the title meant that the current crop of Kingussie players would be the first team since 2004 to win the Grand Slam. The fact it has only been done 12 times in shinty's long history speaks for itself and nothing but admiration can be expressed for the club's achievement's on the pitch in 2022.

Breaking the team down into individual accolades is a thankless task considering Kingussie scored an average of 3 goals per game and conceded just 0.6, those kind of numbers simply aren't achievable without a cohesive team unit. However, one player did receive commendation for his efforts at the annual end of season awards, Roddy Young. 36 goals, including 5 consecutive 3+ goal games, earned him the MOWI Premiership/National Player of the Year for the 2022 campaign.

Speaking of his 2022 season Young said: "It was amazing to be a part of that team, winning the Grand Slam is an incredible achievement and something that no one can ever take away from us. On a personal level, I am delighted to be awarded the Player of the Season but there is no way that I hit those numbers without the kind of support that I have behind me, and that goes right the way back to the defenders who have been immense."





Reflecting on winning the Grand Slam, Manager John Gibson said: "It was a great season, pretty near perfect, a draw on the final day and a defeat at Reraig against Shiel but other than that it's been amazing. When you put it all together and take into account the injuries that we have had this season, to achieve what the players have achieved is massive."

Captain, Savio Genini said: "It's been an amazing season, can't thank all the boys enough, I'll not have a better season in shinty than this. Obviously, we are hoping we can replicate this achievement again, but to do it as club captain, to lift every piece of silverware, is incredible. It's definitely not just for me though, for the town, the team, everyone behind the scenes, it's huge. I've played with this team right up through Primary school and to win the whole lot it is amazing and something I've dreamed of doing ever since I was a wee boy."

Badenoch Ladies secured the title with a 6-1 win over nearest rivals Skye on the last day of the season. That win meant that they completed all 12 games without defeat, their only dropped points coming against Lochaber in June (0-0). Similarly to Kingussie, the numbers behind Badenoch's title win were incredible with the team averaging 7.5 goals per game and conceding just 0.33. Victory in the MOWI WCA Valerie Fraser Camanachd Cup Final, also over Skye, meant that the season was as close to perfect as you can get.

Of the club's 90 goals, Kirsty Deans bagged an incredible 47 and once again stood out in what was a remarkable campaign overall. One half of the MOWI Managers of the Season, lain Robinson said: "Winning the league is a very proud moment for us as a Club as we confirm the first league and cup double in the clubs history. Winning the league was certainly our goal at the start of the season but going out and doing that can be a tough ask at times as there are plenty of sticky fixtures along the way. I feel our success in the league and cup this season is exactly what all the girls deserve for their tireless work every week in training and on match days."

Col-Glen are MOWI South Division 1 Champions

Congratulations to Col-Glen who lifted the MOWI South Division 1 title after beating Ballachulish 10-0 at Dunoon Stadium. That result meant the club finished up on an unassailable 25 points for the season and secured promotion to the MOWI National Division.

The MOWI South Division 1 title is Col-Glen's 2nd league title in the past 7 years having won MOWI South Division 2 in 2015. From South 2 to National Division shinty in 7 years (2 of which were lost to the pandemic) is an impressive feat and the fact Col-Glen still have a very young squad should bode well for the future. 20 goal Andrew MacVicar has been a real inspiration to his side but goals have not been too hard to come by on all fronts with Col-Glen averaging 3.82 goals per game this season.

Newtonmore's triumph had a knock on effect down in Glendaruel as Col-Glen are now guaranteed MOWI National Division shinty in 2023 as Newtonmore II are ineligible for promotion.

Glenurguhart lifted the MOWI WCA North Division 2 title after overcoming Glengarry on the final day of the season. That result meant that Kinlochshiel could not catch them despite having 2 games in hand, with Shiel going on to win both of these games, it meant that Glenurguhart were champions by just one point. Although they didn't know it at the time, when looking back at the full season it becomes clear just how vital their opening day victory against Shiel was, a 5-0 victory which saw 4 different scorers and began the club's journey towards league title glory. The away fixture at Reraig proved not to be as fruitful but a draw meant that they kept the MOWI WCA Challenge Cup Winners at arm's length and a run of 5 wins at the end of the season meant that's how it staved.

Having reformed in just 2018, to win the league in only the 3rd full season since then is an impressive achievement and something that everyone at the club should be very proud of. Averaging a wicked 6.3 goals per game shows great consistency across the league campaign and meant that

Having wrapped up the title a few weeks before against Kilmallie, you might have expected Beauly to be going through the motions on the final day. However, this was far from the truth. An emphatic 13-1 home victory made sure that the greens signed off their victorious league campaign in style. Lee Dunbar opened the scoring 4 minutes in and by 15 minutes it was 3-0 and all but over courtesy of Finlay MacLennan and Calum Maclver. One goal is always something to celebrate but MacLennan didn't stop there, bagging 7 on the day, supplemented by goals from Kyle McDonald, Fraser Cameron and a brace from Scott MacLean - Beauly stormed to their eventual 12 goal margin of victory – Martin Ross bagging a consolation goal for Strathspey.

That truly swashbuckling performance was endemic of Beauly II's season as a whole, their only hiccup came away to Aberdeen University back in May, and gives real cause for optimism amongst the Braeview ranks. Moving up to MOWI North Division 1 will be a real test for the side who were defeated by both Lovat and Newtonmore (both N1 sides) this year. However, victories against Glenurguhart and Kinlochshiel (also both N1 sides) goes to show that perhaps this is the level that Beauly II should be competing at.

Kyle McDonald, Beauly II Co-Manager said:



NEWTONMORE RETAIN THE HIGHLAND INDUSTRIAL SUPPLIES SUTHERLAND CUP IN DRAMATIC FASHION

Blairbeg Park, Drumnadrochit, was once again the home of the Highland Industrial Supplies Sutherland Cup Final, a closely contested match that ended in familiar circumstances, Newtonmore lifting the trophy.

Ahead of the match, it is safe to say that Newtonmore were the favourites, the Badenoch side were battling it out for the league title while Lovat sat 3rd bottom and had been on the receiving end of a 7-1 score line the last time the sides met, in the Strathdearn Cup Final that year. Martin MacLean got the game underway in what was a surprisingly warm day for October and both teams stood up to the occasion from the off. Newtonmore with a lot of pressure on the Lovat goal in the early stages but, resolute defending and quick thinking from forward Raymond Rennie led to the first goal of the game for the black and whites. Ten minutes later and Newtonmore were back in it through Glen MacKintosh, a shie was controlled by the veteran forward who found a half vard and fired it across goal and into Lovat keeper Ronan MacMillan's far corner. From there, Newtonmore took a foothold in the game and really started to pile the pressure on to the Lovat goal - MacMillan however, pulled off a string of great stops to keep the score level going into the break.

The second period started much the same as the first had ended with MacMillan making another couple of good saves





in the opening 5 minutes. Again, against the run of play, Lovat scored to put themselves 2-1 up - Rennie getting a good block in against his man then rifling a shot beyond MacDonald and into the bottom corner. Newtonmore ramped up the pressure again with plenty of well worked chances, however, they struggled to hit the target and when they did MacMillan was like a man possessed - diverting chance after chance. That was until Craig MacLeod was fouled inside the area, Glen MacKintosh stepped up and cracked one into the back of the net from the penalty spot, 2-2 with 15 minutes left on the clock - squeaky bum time indeed.

Much of the final 15 however, was played in the middle of the park, both teams creating half chances at best and so the game went into extra-time. KINGS CROWNED ARTEMIS MACAULAY CUP CHAMPIONS

Oban Camanachd and Kingussie met in the 2022 Artemis Macaulay Cup Final at Mossfield Park, Oban on 21st August.

The game came just one week after the two sides met in the Tulloch Homes Camanachd Cup Semi-Final, Kingussie prevailing on that occasion by 4 goals to 1. Ahead of throw up there were some whispers about a Kingussie Grand Slam, the Badenoch side would have to put thoughts of that to the side though as they geared up to face a determined Oban Camanachd desperate to have their name inscribed upon the Macaulay Cup for the first time since 1995.

Five minutes into the game, the first chance came to Oban Camanachd, a lofted free hit sailed over its intended target and goalkeeper Bob McGregor was content to see it either go in or wide, it hit the post however, and trickled along the goal line with Daniel MacVicar unfortunate not to get a stick on it and turn it in at the back post.

A minute later and it was more than a scare for Kings as Camanachd went 1-0 up. A shot from distance deflected off the Kingussie defender and landed right in the path of MacVicar who flicked the ball up and knocked it over the onrushing McGregor.

The lead didn't last long however, as Kingussie won a free-hit at the byline. It was rolled back by Savio Genini into the path of James Hutchison (a makeshift Wing-Forward for the day) who swept the ball in expertly on his backhand.

10 minutes later and Oban Camanachd were in the lead again. All 4 forwards worked the ball delicately between them but the shot was well prevented by the Kings backline, however, the ball broke free to McGregor who tried to clear the ball up the park but Daniel Madej had other ideas and dashed in to get a block in and make it 2-1 to Camanachd.

On the 25 minute mark, a mix up in defence nearly allowed Savio Genini a tap in but the ball was swept wide by Cammy Sutherland and just ten minutes later, the same man had the ball in the back of the net after following in on a well struck Roddy Young shot, however, the goal was ruled out for a kick in the area. That was the final notable action of the first half as Oban Camanachd went in with a slender 2-1 lead.









Oban Camanachd started the second half more brightly but despite some pressure they were unable to find anything to trouble McGregor in goal - Kings defending the D well and suffocating the attacks. The holders then broke away on the counter with Lee Bain finding Roddy Young on the right wing; shinty's top scorer faced up his man, found half a yard, and drilled the ball across Sutherland into the bottom corner - that goal taking him to 30 for the season. Young ran to the crowd to celebrate with father Dallas who, of course, won this competition many times in the 1990s.

In the 64th minute Kingussie took the lead for the first time in the game, this time it was Ruaraidh Anderson who cracked a shot in at the back post following a corner from Kingussie making it 3-2 for Kings with just under a third of the game left to play.

The next 15 minutes were full of Kingussie pressure with Young, Anderson and Genini starting to work their magic - Cammy Sutherland kept Camanachd in touching distance in the 78th minute with a wonderful diving save before getting back to his feet to deal with the rebound.

Oban weren't without threat in the closing period -Daniel Cameron moved into the forward line and was unlucky to drag a shot wide of McGregor's right hand post.

Even as Oban Camanachd searched for an equaliser. Young was still working his magic in the Kingussie forward line, cutting inside from the right hand side and forcing Sutherland into another good save - this time with his feet.

The holders kept pressure on the Oban goal, which was as much of a defensive tactic as it was with the real desire to double their lead. Half-Swing Podcast Man of the Match Roddy Young ran the defence ragged and won a few vital fouls in the final 10 minutes which relieved any pressure on the King's backline. After 93 minutes of breathless action, Des McNulty brought the game to a close and Kingussie were crowned Artemis Macaulay Cup Champions once again. NEWTONMORE ARE VICTORIOUS IN STRATHDEARN CUP FINAL

A baking hot day at Smith Park, Inverarnie was the setting for the 2022 Strathdearn Cup Final which once again saw Newtonmore and Lovat come together to battle it out for the trophy. The Final the previous year was one of the most bizarre games in cup final history, 0-0 at Full-Time, 4-0 to Newtonmore at Half-Time of Extra-Time and 4-4 at Full-Time with Lovat going on to win the penalty shootout. To make it to the 2022 Final Newtonmore had beaten Caberfeidh comfortably at home while Lovat had edged past local rivals Beauly in their semi-final.

John Matheson got the game underway in front of a healthy crowd who had come out to enjoy the sunshine and shinty – a rare combination!

It didn't take Newtonmore long to get going, Craig MacLeod dribbled the ball down the wing and cut the ball back to the edge of the D, from there top scorer Glen MacKintosh turned the ball and fired high into the net. Two minutes later and it was Evan Menzies who struck for 'More, a shot from MacLeod was well saved by Ronan MacMillan in the Lovat goal only to fall at the feet of Menzies who hammered home from a tight angle.

Lovat bounced back quickly this time though grabbing a goal of their own, Ryan Ferguson held off his man well on the right-wing before drilling the ball into Player/Manager Raymond Rennie who fired across Jason MacDonald in the Newtonmore net to make it 2-1. Newtonmore kept up the pressure for most of the first half but were kept quiet by a resolute Lovat defence, the Kiltarlity side weren't without their chances though Lewis Bryson putting one agonisingly wide of MacDonald's left hand post 10 minutes from half-time. The remainder of the half came and went and both sets of players, and indeed the officials would have been glad to get some rest out of the baking sun. The second half started much as the first had ended, some half chances here and there but nothing to get either sets of fans too excited. That was until the 62nd minute when MacLeod picked up the ball, ran down the right wing and lashed a shot high into the opposite corner for 3-1. Four minutes later and it was four for 'More after Evan Menzies was taken out in the D – Glen MacKintosh stepped up to fire home his second of the match from the penalty spot.

Ten minutes from time and Newtonmore bagged another - Menzies, who wore the number 4 in memory of his best friend Andy MacKintosh, with his second of the game after the Lovat defence failed to clear from a corner. With that goal, what energy remained in Lovat legs seemed to fade and three minutes later MacKintosh grabbed his hat-trick, finishing from a tight angle after getting the ball broke to the by-line from a botched clearance. Charlie Ferguson put the cherry on the icing on the cake after Glen MacKintosh - double marked at this point – found him with the freedom of Smith Park on the edge of the D to pick his spot in MacMillan's bottom left corner.

In fairness to Lovat, despite the score line they continued to battle away, they just came up against a 'More side that was too strong on the day and John Matheson brough the game to a close at Newtonmore 7-1 Lovat. All that was left was for Newtonmore Captain James Ross to collect the Strathdearn Cup from Camanachd Association Director Kirsty Deans and lift it high in the air much to the delight of his teammates.

SOLD OUT TULLOCH HOMES CAMANACHD CUP FINAL PROVIDES RICH ENTERTAINMENT AND LATE DRAMA...

Saturday 17th September saw the shinty world flock to the sold out 2022 Tulloch Homes Camanachd Cup Final in Kingussie. The final saw Kingussie take on Lovat at The Dell and was supported by a week long festival of events speared by the Final Fling post-match concert.

Deek Cameron got the game underway following a shower of rain which had left the immaculate pitch slick, perfect conditions for a game. Almost immediately from throw up, the first chance landed at the feet of Lewis Tawse, the Lovat man unable to get a clean strike away from the right hand side of the D - the ball skipping past Bob MacGregor's post. Kingussie returned the favour seconds later, Roddy Young pushed the ball into the centre, broke free of his man, but fired wide from 25 yards.

On the 14 minute mark the first major chance came with Lovat's Marc MacLachlan impressively holding off a couple of defenders before sliding the ball to Greg Matheson. Matheson ran onto the ball and leathered a shot towards the bottom right from close range, only to be denied by MacGregor.

It was Kingussie that took the lead on the 27th minute though, a Ruaridh Anderson corner was lifted into Captain Savio Genini who shrugged off his man and fired beyond Stuart MacDonald despite the Lovat keeper getting a stick to it. Soon after and it could have been two, Roddy Young



darted past his man and drove into the box, the ball deflected back to Anderson who was denied by a great stop from MacDonald. That chance proved to be the final talking point of the 1st half and Deek Cameron brought the teams in at 1-0.

Lovat started brightly in the 2nd half with Matheson firing just wide of the far post after some delightful linkup play down the left hand side. Again Lovat came and after making a great save with his hand from a long distance Calum MacAulay drive, Kingussie 'Keeper MacGregor then had red and blue hearts in mouths as he ran the ball 25 yards up the pitch, Lovat however, were unable to gain the possession that would surely have meant a goal.

Undeterred, MacGregor made another great save just moments later as a Callum Cruden hit looped up and sank dangerously towards the Kingussie net. Soon after, Lovat's pressure paid off, a corner sailed over to the opposite side where Fraser Heath took on his man and drove a ball back across to the corner taker MacAulay who cracked a powerful shot over MacGregors head from outside the D – a well worked corner routine from the Kiltarlity based side.

The game became a very physical contest after the equaliser with neither side creating too much – that was until the final 10 minutes of the game. Heath collected the ball with his back to goal, moved it side to side to create a half yard and rifled one at the Kingussie goal – MacGregor made a smart save to deny him though. The game seemed destined for extra-time when Roddy Young picked the pocket of a Lovat centre and drove up the line in what was one of the truly great moments in recent shinty. Despite a few attempts, no man, (or stick) could bring Young down and after covering upwards of 40 yards he slid the ball in-field to James Falconer who took a touch to control it before firing expertly into the bottom corner. 2-1 in the 88th minute and the Kingussie crowd went wild as they closed in on their 24th Camanachd Cup triumph.

Kingussie weren't done there though – 3 minutes later Genini skipped in field from the left wing and powered one at goal, the initial attempt was saved by MacDonald but there was



little he could do to stop the rebound from the onrushing Young - a goal to mark what was an incredible personal display from him.

With that Deek Cameron brought an end to the 126th Tulloch Homes Camanachd Cup Final and Kingussie were once again crowned champions of Scotland. The Albert Smith Medal was presented to King's Keeper Bob MacGregor for a stellar performance in nets.

Both sides put on an impressive display of character, passion and courage throughout the day but in the end it was

Kingussie who proved to have the quality to etch their name upon the famous trophy once more.

Congratulations also must go to referee Deek Cameron and his team of officials without whom occasions like this simply would not be possible.

Commiserations to Lovat who have shown remarkable consistency appearing in 5 of the last 7 Tulloch Homes Camanachd Cup Finals and we expect we will be seeing a lot more of them over the coming years.







REFLECTION ON THE FINAL FLING

The idea to bid for a Camanachd Cup Final first surfaced during the half hour after Beauly had won a Balliemore Cup Final on the Dell in 2015. The Balliemore Final had been particularly exciting with a 5-3 score line and as members of the Kingussie Club stood around they started speculating as to whether the Dell could host a Camanachd Cup Final. At the forefront of the suggestion were Russell Jones and Jimmy Gow. It had been 1999 since Kingussie had last hosted a Camanachd Cup Final.

It didn't take long to prepare a bid, and by 2016 Kingussie had asked the Camanachd Association if the 2020 Camanachd Final could be held at the Dell.

The vision to add some after-match entertainment was entirely Russell Jones's, and some initial communication with Gary Innes, Keir Gibson and the Manager of Peat & Diesel, Robert Hicks, confirmed that it could be possible.

Kingussie were formally told in July 2019 that they were being offered the 2020 Camanachd Cup Final, and what followed was an intense six months of learning what infrastructure, licences, and ticketing would be required to put on the cup final with a major concert in the evening.

By February 2020, Manran, Peat & Diesel, and Keir Gibson had all confirmed they would play, and the contracts were signed. All that was needed was a name for the concert. There were many suggestions, most of them with the name the Dell built in to them, but when Kingussie supporter, David Dunn, suggested "The Final Fling" it was clear that it was the perfect title.

The Kingussie Committee made the decision in February 2020 to go ahead and launch the tickets. It was a careful decision as it was clear that a considerable number of tickets









would need to be sold for the Final Fling to "break-even". Tickets sales were healthy for the first couple of weeks in March 2020, but then the Covid-19 lock-down struck and the ticket sales ceased for two years.

Ticket sales were re-launched in the Spring of 2022 and the event took off. Much of the success of the Final Fling comes down to the marketing skills of Katie Moneagle who produced some exceptional social media video promotions. By the time the day approached, Kingussie had secured a place in the Cup Final, and enough tickets had been sold to make the event a success. The Final Fling concert turned out to be an incredible evening with a couple of thousand people enjoying an evening of traditional music and celebration.

Did Russell Jones achieve his vision of putting on the biggest event ever seen in Badenoch? Yes, without guestion.

Caitlin, how are you getting on – just how excited are you that shinty is back in a full season? I'm doing well, I am very excited to see how this season goes..

Can you tell us a little bit about your time as a shinty ambassador, what did you gain from that experience? Being a shinty ambassador really helped me develop my leadership, communication and willingness to learn, this has all really helped me going forward in my education and I feel is one of the reasons I have been given as many opportunities

that I have been offered.

This Saturday you made another milestone in your shinty career by refereeing Caberfeidh vs Kingussie in MOWI North Division 1 - how did you find that?

Refereeing a senior shinty match was definitely a bit intimidating, I have refereed before but not at this level but it was definitely something that made me proud by the end of the match. Refereeing definitely allows you to gain a bit more respect for those that have been doing it for years.

On Sunday to top off a shinty filled weekend you played for Inverness against Skye in MOWI WCA National Division. How did the game go, what did you make of the step up to the National?

The game against Skye was a good one, they are a very well established side in the National league so for us to come away with a 2-0 loss at the start of the season was a good result. However the girls did come away thinking we could have done more which to me shows the determination we have as a team. I think for Inverness to make that step is definitely a big one but one that needed to happen, it allows us to have a team in the North league and allows the girls that deserve game time and a chance to play at a high and competitive level a chance and allows for the some of our girls to take a leading roles in a team which should allow them to progress.

What are your goals for the rest of the season in terms of playing?

My goals for playing this season is to try to play as many games as possible and try to make improvements in my own game by playing against the best. I want to progress my game in goals and we are really aiming to get positive results out of every-game we play. I also want to help develop the players around me and become a strong unit.





What would you say to anyone who was considering refereeing?

I would say if you have the bravery to pick up a stick, you should also be brave enough to pick up a whistle. I think everyone should try to referee at some point, it shows how much respect we should be giving to officials of the game. I would say if you want to try it definitely get involved somehow, referees are needed at every level of the game so starting out with youth games allows you to get a grips with it.

Following this interview, Caitlin would go on to officiate at the Tulloch Homes Camanachd Cup Final in Kingussie and help guide Inverness to a mid-table finish in the WCA MOWI National Division.



GAELIC YOUTH THRIVES

Promoting the use of Gaelic in shinty has been at the heart of Iomain Cholmcille's work since it started in 2007.

2022 was the busiest year yet with 6 events. 4 legs of Cupa Iomain na h-Òige were held in Bishopbriggs, Strathpeffer, Portree and Acharacle. The first three coincided with World Gaelic Week 2022.

Sgoil Ghàidhlig Ghlaschu, Bun-sgoil Ghàidhlig Inbhir Nis, Bun-sgoil Ghàidhlig Phort Rìgh and Bun-sgoil Àth Tharracail won the competitions on the park respectively, whilst Bunsgoil Ghleann Dail, Craighill Primary (Tain), Stafainn/Kilmuir and Acharacle won Duaisean na Gàidhlig for Gaelic usage and ethos.

In addition, there was a Gaelic development day in Ullapool which was hosted by Camanachd Leòdhais which drew Nairn and Ross-shire young people and had coaching and a blitz tournament won by Na Leòdhasaich.

There was also the revival of Farpais nan Gàidheal as a secondary age tournament run by Sgoil Ghàidhlig Ghlaschu which was won by SGG, beating Inverness Royal Academy and Camanachd Dhùn Èideann.



In all almost 250 young people took part in these events using Gaelic in a fun and sporting manner.

The School of Shinty programme continues to develop into new areas across Scotland. Plockton and Bishopbriggs have become the latest schools to sign-up to the Camanachd Association programme aimed at increasing participation, providing opportunities and developing performance for children of all ages within the school environment.

The programme has seen the development of a Schools of Shinty Accreditation Scheme that has three tiers with an entry level starting at Bronze followed by Silver and Gold. Each level has a minimum criteria of curriculum hours that a school will teach in an academic year. The current Schools of Shinty are:

Plockton High School signed their agreement in June and will go into the programme with support from the local shinty clubs; Kinlochshiel, Lochcarron and South Skye Juniors.

The plans are aimed at ensuring continued growth of shinty within Plockton High School to meet the development aims of both the school and the local clubs. This will include shinty being delivered on the PE curriculum to all S1 and S2 pupils, an extracurricular club being championed by the schools Shinty Ambassadors and participation in Camanachd Association school competitions with a pathway to local club participation and competition at the forefront.

The key aspects of shinty that the School will also incorporate includes:

• Coach education (Staff and pupils)

• Officiating education (Staff members and pupils) delivered

by the Camanachd Association Regional Development Staff with support from the local shinty Clubs.

Announcing the inspired new initiative, Head Teacher Susan Galloway said, "We are excited to be in partnership with the Camanachd Association to become a School of Shinty. The benefits that this will have on not for Plockton High School but the local shinty teams and community are fantastic'

Derek Keir, Chief Executive Officer of the Camanachd Association is delighted with the announcement and said, "Primary School participation is taking off again after a couple of tough years. Sustaining this into secondary schools is a priority for us, and broadening the number of people delivering shinty to young people is key to this. The school of shinty at Plockton does just that.'

Ishbel McLeod from Bishopbriggs said: "It's been great for our pupils to play their sport for our school in an area that there isn't a lot of opportunity for this. We have introduced pupils to a sport that they otherwise wouldn't have known, and created a great shinty community within the school."

Both teams came into the game fresh from midweek wins in the Semi-Final, with Shiel beating Inverness 5-0 and Beauly winning 5-1 against Fort William. The teams were piped out onto the pitch and assumed their positions before Ally Paterson threw the ball up to start the game. The swollen crowd were boisterous even then and this was a theme throughout the match. Beauly had the strong wind at their back to start, however, despite some early pressure it was Kinlochshiel who opened the scoring. A shie from Shiel's Rory Barclay wasn't cleared by the Beauly backline, the ball finding its way to Seamus Martin, his low strike was well saved by Lennox Stewart but Archie MacRae (scorer in the 2021 senior final) was the fastest onto the rebound and tucked it neatly in at Stewart's near post.

Beauly, while a little shaken, still had the wind and it didn't take them long to get into a kind of rhythm, then in the 28th minute they got the equaliser. Finlay "Stork" MacLennan found Torrin Cairns who was initially well marshalled by Shiel's Arron Jack – however, the ball eventually broke to Callum MacIver whose shot off the defender dropped to Scott Cameron who in turn clipped the ball into the net beyond Calum MacMillan.

A minute later, Beauly doubled their lead. Logan Morton picked out Torrin Cairns, grandson of the great Sandy MacKay, who slotted a composed finish inside MacMillan's right hand post. The remainder of the half came and went without any major incident and although Beauly led 2-1 at half-time, Shiel would have the wind in the second half. At the start of the 2nd half Stewart was brought into action quite a few times including an impressive stop and air clearance from a Shiel shie, just as Archie MacRae was lurking for his second of the match. Soon after, Kieran Martin tried from range and Stewart was forced into another solid stop, this time relying on defenders Ewan More and Charlie MacRae to marshal Archie MacRae away from danger. Not long after that Logan Morton hit a ball from the centre into Scott Cameron – his shot from range appeared to take a ricochet off either Callum MacIver for Beauly or a Shiel defender and ended up in the back of the net (time for a Camanachd Association dubious goals panel?).

Shiel almost had one back soon after with MacRae's shot saved by Stewart and appearing at the feet of Kieran Martin 3 yards out, however, despite his best efforts the Beauly backline were able to deal with the threat. Shiel continued to dominate the territory but weren't able to muster too many shots and those they did let loose were blocked bravely by the Beauly backline. Perhaps growing frustrated, Kieran Martin tried one from distance that brought out a good save from Stewart high towards the top left corner - the ball eventually being cleared. That was the last major chance in the game and so it ended 3-1 to Beauly who retained the cottages.com MacTavish Juvenile Cup. Beauly Captain and Sandy MacKay Medal recipient (MOTM) Finlay "Stork" MacLennan took to the box to receive the trophy from sponsors cottages.com.

Martin MacLean got the game underway and it wasn't long before the first chance of the game, a cross field ball from Skye Captain Ian MacInnes found Calum MacKenzie, who was unfortunate not to score from close range. The 2022 MacQuisten cup took place at Inveraray's Winterton park on Sunday the 28th August.

The format was round robin with the top two teams going through to the final. The entrants for this year were Bute Shinty Club, Kilmory Shinty Club, Oban Camanachd Shinty Club and a select team made up from other South teams who did not have enough players to enter an outright team. It was a tight affair from the 1st game - this being between Oban Camanachd and Bute - Craig Scott brought the game to an end with a 1-1 draw after some fine competitive shinty being played by both clubs.

Game 2 was between the select team who had players from Dunoon, GMA and Celtic among their ranks versus Bute and this also ended in a 1-1.

Game 3 saw Kilmory, the majority of who's players had featured in the previous days Bullough Cup Final, take to the field versus Oban Camanchd who came out 5-1 winners. Game 4 was the select team versus Kilmory with the select team coming out 2-0 victors.

After the break it was Bute versus Kilmory with Bute also running out 2-0 victors over Kilmory. The final game saw the select team and Oban Camanachd play out a 0-0 draw. MacLeod whose powerful effort across the keeper gave Finlay Chisholm no chance. 6 minutes later and it was 3-1, this time lan Graham with a long distance strike from the left, which was well dummied by MacLeod to deceive the 'More keeper. A fourth followed soon after, a long range shot from Langlands was well saved by Chisholm but there was nothing he could do to stop Riley Anderson sweeping in the rebound. Newtonmore piled on the pressure to try and force their way back into the game but a combination of good defending and some great stops from Buchan meant that it ended 4-1.

Skye Captain Ian MacInnes was presented with the trophy by David MacMaster and lifted it high into the air at the Dell, much to the delight of Skye's travelling support.



There was some terrific shinty played throughout the group stages with some of the South's best young shinty players on display. The day was also attended by the South Under 17 coaches which enabled them to analyse the players with a view to their South squad selection; a process made all the more difficult due to the array of talent on show.

Another tight affair ensued with end to end shinty and tight tussles all over the field. The Ferguson Transport and Shipping National finals brought together over 150 of the best young players from across Scotland all vying for the coveted National P5 and P7 titles.

The P7 & Under tournament was played at the Nevis Centre, Fort William in front of a large and noisy crowd. The standard of play throughout the day was of the highest order with all the 11 teams giving a great account of themselves.

Section A saw the impressive Muirtown Primary School top the group on maximum points with the equally impressive Glenurquhart/Balnain team two points behind, claiming the runners-up spot. Section B was extremely competitive, with the impressive North End Primary topping the group, with Strathkelvin Primary in second spot.

The first semi-final saw Muirtown Primary School take on Strathkelvin Primary, with Muirtown proving too strong winning 6-0 to book their place in the final.

The second semi-final saw Section B winners North End take on Glenurguhart/Balnain Primaries in what was a closely contested game, with Glenurquhart/Balnain prevailing 1-0 to reach the final against a Muirtown side they had already played in the group matches.

The final between Muirtown Primary and Glenurguhart /Balnian Primaries was, like their earlier encounter, a closely contested match with the standard of play of the highest order. Inverness Gaelic School were a close second, showing some solid displays and only losing out to Caol

The first semi-final saw Group 1 winners Lochcarron taking on Group 2 Runners Up, Inverness Gaelic School. Lochcarron took a quick 2-0 lead but after a quick reshuffle the Inverness school came back to make it 2-2. Another goal apiece saw the game finish 3-3 and extra time with the golden goal rule in place begin. 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SOUTH ON TOP IN CAOL CUP

The South, boasting a Premiership midfield three of Finlay Ralston (GMA), Blair MacFarlane (Oban C) and captain Conor Kennedy (Kyles), found their rhythm, as they began to win their individual battles and spray the ball long in to danger areas.

Calls for a South penalty were waved off by referee Calum Girvan, as Skye's Callum Nicholson looked to have kicked the ball whilst smartly denying a Conor Kennedy strike. South frustrations quickly turned to joy, as ColGlen's Scott MacVicar opened the scoring on the half hour mark, with the forward striking home from 25 yards after a neat pass from Kennedy.

The North upped the tempo following this, as this Caol Cup clash quickly became a physical affair, with both sides battling across the park as the match heated up. A kick in the North box forced referee Girvan to point to the spot, giving the South a huge opportunity to double their advantage. Penalty expert MacVicar stood up and made no mistake, giving the men in red a two goal cushion.

The South were in full flow, getting the best of their opponents across the park. Kyles' Sorley Thomson had an excellent opportunity to make it three before the interval, yet his effort from outside the area was expertly denied by Nicholson who was enjoying a brilliant afternoon between the sticks.

The break gave the young North side a chance to regroup, as they looked to find a way back in this contest which was being dominated by a relentless South outfit. Fort William's Victor Smith would give his side a lifeline, as he reacted quickest to send a left-sided effort beyond Symons in the South goal to make it 2-1 with a lot of shinty left to play.



However, only two minutes later, Ardnamurchan's Herbie Patterson restored the South's two goal cushion. The towering forward broke away from a penalty spot stramash, before planting a low strike in to the net, leaving Nicholson with no chance.

Throughout the remainder of the contest, the South looked very comfortable, with any rare North venture in to their half being swept away by the stubborn South back line. Particularly, Oban Celtic's Jamie Forgrieve denied a multitude of potential attacking opportunities, as he dominated at halfback.

Referee Girvan eventually blew for full-time, crowning the South U21's deserved Caol Cup Champions for 2021.

LOCHABER SHINTY CLUBS PARTNER WITH SAMH TO "GAIN THE ADVANTAGE"

Two Lochaber based shinty clubs have teamed up with Scottish Association for Mental Health in order to further their commitment to the health and wellbeing of their players, volunteers & supporters.

The 'Gain the Advantage Programme' is open to all those involved in Fort William and Kilmallie Shinty Clubs and their wider community, to positively engage with a variety of activities, workshops and events based around the 5 ways to wellbeing. These are Connect, Be Active, Take Notice, Learn and Give. Introducing individuals at an earlier stage with the opportunity to explore their mental health, engage with tools and resources to increase their capacity to support their own and others mental health and wellbeing, building both personal and community resilience.

SAMH workers Nina Allinson and Steph McLean began this journey by meeting with local 'School of Shinty' Lochaber High School. Also in attendance that day were representatives from some of shinty's biggest supporters including MOWI and Ferguson Transport, as well as Camanachd Association National Development Manager, Ronald Ross and Youth Director Willie MacDonald.

Following their introduction to Lochaber High School and some of the area's major employers, Nina and Steph delivered to members of Kilmallie Shinty Club and Fort William Shinty Club ahead of the Lochaber Derby. It is hoped that the resource that SAMH are able to offer will enable these clubs and the area as a whole to become more mentally healthy. This work is in addition to the ongoing Shinty Chaplaincy programme which both clubs have endorsed.





Since the first meeting, Minister for Public Health, Women's Health & Sport, Maree Todd met with the Lochaber clubs, Camanachd Association Board Members, SAMH & Mikeysline representatives at Fort William Shinty Clubhouse to take part in further discussions about creating mentally healthy communities, even trying her hand at the sport (see above).

Ronald Ross, Regional Development Manager, Camanachd Association said:

"We are delighted to move forward with the "Gain the Advantage" programme and to provide better support for shinty communities. This year long initiative compliments all the work we do with partners in this sphere including; Samaritans, Scottish Sports Chaplaincy, Mikeysline and more. Well done to both clubs and Lochaber High School for embracing the opportunity to develop mentally healthy communities."

The programme has since been expanded to encompass all the clubs in the Lochaber region.

As we emerged from 2021 the English Shinty Association knew it needed to adapt to the new normal. SHINTY MEMORIES SCOTLAND

Shinty Memories Scotland has continued its recovery from the rigours of the COVID pandemic and like other areas of shinty is still having to meet some very significant challenges. Our activities were clearly curtailed and had to be realigned significantly to meet the new world of post-covid meetings and activity. This has placed a great strain on the groups and our national resources. We need more support now than we ever did and the scale of the challenge we face continues to escalate. However, as we emerge from the bewildering restrictions we have all faced, it remains our intention to grow and expand the network of groups currently in place under the umbrella of Shinty Memories Scotland, currently chaired by David MacMaster of Caberfeidh. John MacKenzie MBE (Scotland and Newtonmore) is the project Ambassador. We are currently seeking SCIO charitable status.

The national group was formed to support the network using the sport's archives and other resources to help people with dementia and living with other issues such as depression and loneliness. The work is also contributing towards the Camanachd Association's new Heritage Committee's activities. Shinty Memories Groups are open to anyone and when they are set up, they are supplied with sets of cards and other materials which have been prepared from various archives using images of players, trophies, pitches and badges. Various activities such as quizzes and fundraising veterans' matches are being organised.

Individual groups such as the Badenoch Shinty Memories Group have secured significant support from funding agencies such as Life Changes Trust and others locally in the Cairngorm area. The plan is to use their collaboration with the Highland Folk Museum as a model of developments in other areas such as Inveraray, Oban and Lochaber. We are greatly encouraged to see the formation and expansion of groups in places such as Skye and Inveraray where the Memories group is being woven into a fantastic five-year development plan. We were delighted to receive a massive boost at the Tulloch Homes 2021 Camanachd cup final with the presentation of a cheque for £7,500 which was raised with a special Golf championship at the Craigie Hill Golf Club in Perth. The 2022 event on August 28 at Kingussie (sponsored this time by Birchwood Financial Planning of Elgin) was won by a group of bandits from Skye Camanachd who took the championship trophy designed and crafted by Roddie MacLennan of Inverness home to Portree.

There can be few clubs or families who are not aware of people are who living with the challenges of mental health issues such as dementia. Shinty Memories Groups are now building sets of resources to be used to help people improve their recall, communication skills, self-esteem and confidence. A new handbook is available to help with the operation of groups. Shinty images can be digitised for use of the project and safe return to owners.

MACBEAN CUP SUCCESS FOR LOCHABER HIGH SCHOOL

The MacBean Cup for S1/2 secondary school pupils took place on Monday (16th May) at An Aird in Fort William. A brilliant response saw 12 schools entering from across Scotland, some of which were involved in the competition for the first time.

The schools were split into two groups of six for the first round of the competition with the top two teams from each group then progressing through to the semi-finals. In group one, Kingussie went through their first 5 games impressively undefeated. They were joined by Inverness Royal Academy who bested Charleston on goal difference to claim second spot.

In group two, it was a very tight affair at the top with four teams coming close to progressing. It was however, Lochaber and Portree who made the final cut, both teams remaining undefeated in the group stages.

The final 4 teams were then added on paper to the trophy and the semi-finals were drawn by two Bishopbriggs players who had entered the event for the first time in their history.

Portree were the first team 'out the hat' and would go on to play Inverness Royal Academy in the first semi-final. Pitch 2 would feature Kingussie (2019 winners) and Lochaber.

Portree went on to overcome Inverness Royal Academy by one goal to nil in the first semi-final. Although Portree had the majority of the possession and emerged victorious, the young IRA side competed throughout and defensively played very well. In the second semi-final, Kingussie had a first minute chance saved impressively by the Lochaber keeper, which gave the Lochaber side momentum with them going on to score a number of powerful goals and ending Kingussie's unbeaten run.

The final was an exciting game with Portree and Lochaber drawing 0-0 in their group game it was clear there wasn't much between the sides. A fantastic battle between both sides full centres was impressive to watch and a couple of excellent saves early on by the Portree keeper kept their side in it. A very even game throughout needed a goal and that's what happened inside the final two minutes where a Lochaber forward found himself in a yard of space and sent a low, powerful drive past the Portree keeper to secure their victory.

Congratulations to Lochaber High School who got to take the MacBean Cup back to their school for 2022, and commiserations to Portree High School who gave a fantastic account of themselves and should be very proud of their runners up medals.

Thanks go to all players/teachers/coaches for attending as well as to Fort William Shinty Club for the use of their fantastic ground and for setting up the days pitches and also to James Munro who once again volunteered his time to officiate the days games.

BUGHT PARK RENOVATION ON TRACK

In late 2021, it was announced that Bught Park in Inverness would be renovated after the Highland Council and partners submitted a successful bid to the UK Government's Levelling Up Fund.

There has been further progress in 2022 with the Highland Council confirming that the changing facilities and toilets would be completely refurbished with the stand receiving cosmetic upgrades. In addition to this, a new pitch side pavilion will be built. The upper floor of the pavilion will be a hospitality/bar with the bottom floor reserved as a dedicated space for shinty. This space will be a shinty exhibition called "Shinty's Story". It will aim to represent shinty's culture and place as Scotland's community sport and further details about this project will be announced throughout the course of the year.

In December, Councillors approved the planning for the redevelopment. The Camanachd Association will now look to apply for funding streams to ensure that the exhibition can express shinty's history and heritage in a way that properly reflects its importance to the Highlands, and indeed the nation.

The Committee look forward to continuing to work in co-operation with partners such as Highlife Highland and Inverness Shinty Club to ensure that the project is a success. More information about the progression of this vital development will be available throughout 2023 on www.shinty.com.

For the third final in a row, the Men's Aviemore Trophy went to a penalty shootout. A riveting 2-2 game saw Tayforth's goals by Nathan Ross and Michael MacLeod cancelled out by Angus Thorburn and The Glenturret Man of the Match/Sàr-chluicheadair Roddy MacColl. The only dampener was the lottery of penalties which Aberdour won 1-0 to lift their first ever Senior Trophy in men's shinty.

The Aberdour women earlier won the LearnGaelic Challenge Cup against Tayforth ladies. A hat-trick by Dour's Rebecca Thornton wasn't enough to win her the Glenturret player of the match which went to her teammate Niamh Donnelly.

It was also the final refereeing performances of Henry MacInnes. Famous as the inspiration for the song and tune "The Shinty Referee" by Fergie Macdonald, Henry had refereed for over 45 years and received a presentation and a bottle of The Glenturret to mark his retirement.

In the morning, a combination of come and try shinty and a youth shinty blitz saw around 40 young players from Perthshire, Stirling, Fife and Edinburgh enjoy the sport with the support of the Camanachd Association.

Perth & Kinross Council's Councillor Grant Laing presented the post-match trophies along with John Rennie of the Gaelic Society of Perth. Councillor Laing







voiced his and the council's support for shinty and the hope that the sport can flourish in Perthshire going forward. Anyone interested in supporting shinty in Perthshire should contact the Camanachd Association.

Although it was a double disappointment for Tayforth on the park, they didn't go away empty-handed. To mark their temporary return to the city they were founded in 1973, they were reunited with the Bein Trophy – donated in the 1970s by the Old Bein Inn - which was recovered last year and presented after the match to their captain Nathan Whear along with other archive material.

DONALD MACDOUGALL SKINNER OF OBAN AND GLASGOW, DISTINGUISHED BUSINESSMAN, SHINTY PLAYER AND ADMINISTRATOR

Tributes have been paid from throughout the shinty community to Donald Skinner of Oban and Glasgow, former two-term President, Chieftain and Member of Honour of shinty's Governing Body the Camanachd Association, who died in March 2022.

The Skinner family, over more than a hundred years and through successive generations, have made an immense contribution to shinty. Donald more than made his own mark on the game adding with distinction to an unparalleled family set of circumstances and influences. He was a more than accomplished shinty player in his day and perhaps his only regret in his many years of involvement with the game was, due to family and business circumstances, not being part of the Glasgow Mid Argyll team which won the Camanachd Cup in 1973. It was an unfortunate circumstance he carried philosophically and with typical dignity, and he never allowed it to colour his perspective and recollections of a sport and way of life which left him, in his own words, "with nothing but friends".

He gave everything he had to shinty, despite having more than onerous business and family commitments, serving in a succession of the highest offices in the game, up to and including President and Chieftain, being a recipient of the Marine Harvest Centenary Award in 2017 for his contribution to the game. This was no more than he deserved.

The tributes have been led by the Camanachd Association's current Chieftain John MacKenzie MBE of Newtonmore. He said: "Shinty has lost arguably its most influential and charismatic figure of the last fifty years and more with the passing of Donald Skinner. The Skinner family over the last four generations have made an immense contribution to shinty and Donald more than made his own contribution to an unparalleled family set of influences. He gave everything he had to shinty, serving in a succession of the highest offices in the game up to and including President and Chieftain the Marine Harvest Award for his contribution was no more than he deserved. Donald was someone everyone looked up to and he had a remarkable set of skills, particularly in dealing with people, and he was a role model for many office-bearers who followed in the paths he carved for himself. What he did in shinty was a mirror image of an outstanding business career. His contribution to shinty as an administrator in Glasgow and Oban in particular is unlikely ever to be matched and while he said himself his greatest pleasure was the number of friends he made through the sport, there are so many more now who will be significantly impacted and diminished by his passing. The sympathy of the whole shinty community is extended to Meg, his son David and daughter Morven and their five grandchildren, and everyone else who is at this time understandably feeling a great sense of loss."

Donald had been living with several health issues in the last couple of years, all bravely borne until his passing in the Beatson West of Scotland Cancer Centre in Glasgow. He was a remarkable man who left an amazing legacy in the world of shinty and business through his partnership with the late Calum MacArthur. There were very few West Coasters and particularly students and married couples who did not pay a visit to the offices of Skinner MacArthur on Byres Road for mortgage and/or insurance advice. It was this business acumen which led him to lead shinty into its transformational relationship with leading distillers Glenmorangie, the sports first, modern sponsorship deal which evolved into one of the most enduring and significant in Scottish, if not UK sport.

Donald served on virtually every committee imaginable (mentoring a succession of other office-bearers) and had recently taken time to document his life history. It was during this process that it became apparent that the loss of his own and his grandfather's Presidential silver mounted caman in a house fire had affected him significantly. Steps were taken to have a new caman secured for the family and a silver plate was added with the two names and their relevant Presidential dates. The caman was presented to Donald at home in Bishopbriggs a few weeks ago by David Hamilton of the Macaulay Association which had joined, in a remarkable testament to the esteem with which he was held by everyone, with the Glasgow Celtic Society, Shinty Memories Scotland and the Camanachd Association in the provision of the caman.

The Macaulay Association paid this tribute to their former stalwart: "Donald was our President from 2007 until 2013



when he moved to Glasgow to be nearer his family. In his years as President, he was instrumental in the growth of the Association with the final now being shown live on TV. The current members of the Association would like to offer our sincere condolences to Donald`s family and friends. The shinty world has lost a true gentleman and a great Shinty ambassador."

These sentiments were echoed by Donald Fletcher of the Glasgow Celtic Society. He said: "The Glasgow Celtic Society are saddened by the passing of Donald Skinner who was a former Director, Secretary, Treasurer and Chieftain of the Society. He became a Director of the Glasgow Celtic Society towards the end of the 1960s whilst still a player with Glasgow Mid Argyll; he held the position of Secretary and Treasurer for a number of years, demitting office in 1976 when he became President of the Camanachd Association a position he held for two terms till 1982. He continued as a Director of the Society and made his office in Byres Road available for Society meetings. In 1994 Donald became Chieftain and held that office till 1998. Although he moved back to his Oban roots, he still continued to take an active interest in the Society and helped whenever possible. In more recent years, having returned to reside in the Glasgow area Donald was a regular spectator at shinty matches and seldom missed Celtic Cup ties. Last October, despite indifferent health, Donald managed to attend the Celtic Cup final at Taynuilt. Donald's contribution to the Glasgow Celtic Society and to shinty in the Glasgow area and beyond was immense. He will be sorely missed."

Donald also featured in a new series of Caman Connections podcasts which was recorded a few weeks ago, by complete chance on the very day he received his new silver caman. By his own express wish, the podcast was broadcast just two days before his passing. Gary Innes, who conducted the interview for Caman Connections, said: "It was a great privilege to be able to speak to Donald, particularly as he has been dealing with a number of health issues in the last eighteen months and more. As a distinguished former player. President and Chieftain of the Association, he is someone who literally did everything in the game. It was great to find him in good form and we were very lucky to be able to talk to him just as he received his silver mounted caman from Shinty Memories, the Glasgow Celtic Society, the Macaulay Association and the Camanachd Association to replace his family's camans which were lost in a fire. It was an honour to be in his company and to share his fantastic memories which he recounted with his customary style and panache."


Born and bred in Oban, Donald never forgot and indeed was very proud of his roots, and after his successful career in Glasgow returned there to take over the reins at Skinner Carmichael in Argyll Square, along with his son David.



In the early 70s, Ellis Carmichael joined the Glasgow based company of Skinner Macarthur to run the Oban office which subsequently became Skinner Carmichael and there began a partnership and enduring friendship.

On his return to Oban in the mid-90s Donald very quickly immersed himself in local activities, especially shinty and significant charitable work through Hope 2 Oban, of which he was extremely proud. Ellis Carmichael recalls: "Donald and Meg set up home in Connel and this village also enjoyed his enthusiastic contributions. His sense of community awareness made him a valued and respected member of various committees and there are many who benefited from his involvement here and in Oban, myself included.

Donald loved Oban and its history and we used to jokingly refer to Dunollie Castle as his ancestral seat, this being a reference to his middle name, MacDougall. The Skinner history in Oban extends back generations and their involvement in local affairs shaped the prosperity of the town as we know it today. Donald will be remembered in Argyll with great fondness and gratitude for his contribution and we, the community should be thankful to his family for allowing him the time to do all the things that he did for us all. I consider myself fortunate to have been his business partner and friend for almost 50 years and I will miss his company, his counsel and presence. I know that he will be remembered by many and he will live on in the hearts of those who loved him most."



OBITUARIES

Martin Anderson (Tayforth)

Martin started his shinty career in Inverlochy and Fort William before playing for Aberdeen University. After moving to Perth to take up employment as a well-respected paralegal with Perth & Kinross Council, Martin joined Tayforth. Martin played in a number of positions for the club. Martin also took on a number of roles on the committee including club secretary.

Liz Buchanan (Formerly MacInnes)

Originally from Stornoway, Liz was a driving force in many areas of shinty's key development years in the 1970s and 1980s and went on to have a distinguished career in tourism, for which she was awarded the MBE in 2011, having been a Regional Director of Visit Scotland for a number of years. Liz was one of the driving forces in a dynamic group which consolidated the development of the Shinty Yearbook (becoming joint editor in 1979), the Camanachd Association Referees' Association and perhaps most fondly remembered of all, the late and lamented Aviemore indoor six a side tournament.

Colin Cameron (Strachur & District SC, Strachur-Dunoon)

Strachur's Colin Cameron, who wasa former director of the Camanachd Association, passed away peacefully in June after ashort illness. A player in Strachur's famous 1983 Camanachd Cup final run, Colin had gone on to act as chairman of the club. More recently, he was the manager and driving force behind the Strachur-Dunoon joint senior team, successfully bringing shinty back to his beloved home village after a few barren years - a fitting legacy for a titan of shinty on the Cowal peninsula.

Dave Fallows (Strathspey & Badenoch Herald)

He was a great champion for his beloved Newtonmore - where he was a keen supporter of the shinty team and reporter on the sport for many years for the Strathy – and wider Badenoch and Strathspey. Mr Fallows served Badenoch and Strathspey with distinction for many years in this and many other roles. But he took the tough decision to stand down from the council on health grounds at the previous election.

Morton Fraser (Kingussie)

A long serving and popular teacher at Kingussie High School, Morton was also a familiar face in our town and he will be sadly missed. Along with wife Jo they have watched countless Shinty matches at the Dell and all over the Shinty world as they followed the careers of their sons Torquil and Rory and grandchildren Somhairle, Roma, Cluanie and Grace. Morton was an incredibly loyal supporter and will be always fondly remembered at the Dell.

Neilly Galbraith (Kyles Athletic)

Neilly was a Camanachd Cup winner back in 1956 and went on to captain the club in 1958, lifting the Macaulay Cup after beating Beauly by six goals to one. The last time Neilly stepped onto a shinty pitch was in 2015 as he proudly led out Kyles in the Camanachd cup final v Lovat, marking the occasion of the last time the sides met in the final back in 1953.

Edward (Eddie) Duncan Hughes (Oban Celtic)

A native of Kinlochleven he came to Oban to start as a car salesman he married and settled down with wife Christine. He followed his son Blair through the ranks at Oban Celtic Shinty Club. He was introduced to the Macaulay Association and became an influential member of the association that transformed the Argyllshire Sixes into the Macaulay Sixes in which has run in Oban for many years. He also had a substantial role to play at the running of the Macaulay Cup Final every year.

Ian MacCormack (West Highland Free Press)

Under his 44 year editorship shinty coverage became an integral part of the Free Press's weekly offering and Ian was a familiar figure on touchlines throughout the county – most frequently for matches involving Skye, Kinlochshiel and Lochcarron.lan was originally from Kilmarnock and knew little of shinty when he arrived in 1975. But he quickly became an enthusiastic convert and that was to prove immensely beneficial for the sport across the next four-and-a-half decades.

Allan MacDonald (Glengarry)

Suddenly but peacefully, aged 82 years.

Allan's career as a Forester, saw him locate to different areas and he always found a team to play for, a skilful and tenacious player, he was an asset to any team. In his later stages, Allan travelled the country supporting and cheering on son Gordon and daughter Linda playing for Glengarry - there was always a cup of tea ready for Allan at Craigard. Missed by us all.

Allie MacGregor (Newtonmore)

Allie MacGregor passed away aged 85, his death marked the going of the last member of the Blue and White's Scottish Cup team who beat Kyles Athletic 7-3 at Old Anniesland in Glasgow. Ex-Newtonmore star Rob Ritchie said: "Allie was a skilful defender, small in stature, who kept himself very fit. I recall him running with myself and fellow players around the golf course in the dark, us wearing plimsoles and him wearing his working boots coated in tar, leading the way."

Hugh MacIntyre (Kilmallie)

Former Chairman and Camanachd Cup winning player. We are deeply saddened to hear of the passing of our club chieftain, Hugh 'Shep' Macintyre, peacefully at home. The words 'Kilmallie legend' barely do justice to Hugh's contribution and service to our club throughout his entire life. A particular highlight for Shep was being a member of our 1964 Scottish cup winning side. recorded to all posterity complete with an interview from the inimitable broadcaster, Fyfe Roberston.

John MacKinnon (Skve)

John was a loving husband, father of six, brother, uncle and grandfather to his family, and was a much-loved member of the community. John loved the outdoors, was a keen motorcyclist and, as a loved father, shared his activities with his family.

Evan MacKinnon (Lovat)

Suddenly, but peacefully, at Raigmore Hospital, on Thursday, 21st April, 2022, Evan MacKinnon, Fraser Court, Kiltarlity, aged 67 years. Plumbing and Heating Engineer. Dearly loved dad of Evan, Emma and Mark, loved father-in-law of Amanda, Michael and Gemma, loving partner of Jane, much loved Granda Ev to Dylan, Liam, Evie, Josie and Elsie and dear brother to Alan and Ian. Sadly missed by so many.

Andy MacKintosh (Newtonmore)

There is no doubt Tosh will go down as one of the club's finest players as a Camanachd Cup and MacTavish Cup winning captain in 2018, a winner of the prestigious Albert Smith medal as man of the match in the final two years previously in 2016, and a more than accomplished defender in the finest traditions of the club's expertise with the caman. His athleticism and above all his commitment to the cause would have been no surprise to anyone given the distinguished lineage of which he was the latest and finest exponent, the son of a club legend lain who himself had two very fine playing brothers, along with numerous cousins similarly talented.

David "Murf" MacLean (Beauly)

Murf was a distinguished former player from a prominent Beauly shinty family playing as a stylish wing centre alongside his 3 brothers. He was a winner of the Strathdearn and Sutherland Cups in the 1950's when Beauly were amongst the pre-eminent Shinty clubs in the sport. A retired plumber to trade who worked for Hugh Macrame & co for over 30 years. Father of ex player and current coach Stephen and grandfather of current player David.

Duncan MacPhee (Fort William)

Duncan's contribution to FWSC was immense. He achieved many things in his time as chairman and his support and dedication to the club stemmed from his sons, Niall, Arran, Fraser and Ruaridh, who all played for Fort William at various times. He was extremely proud of them all with Niall captaining the team to win the Camanachd Cup in 2010 and Arran leading out the U21 Scotland team as captain in 2017.

Finlay MacRae (Lovat)

A valued member of Lovat Shinty Club and for many years a vice-president. Finlay had an amazing memory of shinty games and stories as well as a droll sense of humour and will be sorely missed from the sidelines on Saturdays. Finlay's son Ally was a stalwart of Lovat teams for many years, while grandson Stuart is the current Scotland goalkeeper and grandsons Angus and Ashie continue the tradition playing for the black and whites.

Alistair 'Wull' Macrae (Kyles Athletic)

6 times Camanachd Cup winner and Kyles Chieftain for 32 years. A gentleman held in the greatest regard by all those that knew him. Wull will be greatly missed by his club and his community.

Donnie Martin (Skye Camanachd)

There have been many prominent figures in Skye Camanachd's illustrious history but Donnie Martin's role is Ian Urguhart (Kingussie) second to none. Donnie was a good team-mate and young lan played for Kingussie in the late 1960s and was a lifelong players breaking into the senior side, which was a tough supporter of the Club. He was a strong midfield player who environment in the 1970s, spoke of the quiet words of was affectionately known as "Corns". Ian captained Kingussie encouragement from Donnie during the match as the battle First Team during the 1960s and the highlight of his playing continued around them. It was natural that Donnie would career was being part of the 1968 Camanachd Cup Final Team which drew 3-3 with Kyles in the Final, but then lost the replay progress into shinty coaching with the youths, second team management and a two-year stint as Skye Camanachd first 2-1. He will be sadly missed by everyone connected with the year manager in 2004-05. Donnie's tenure as a youth coach Club, and our thoughts are with his wife, Jean, and his family. was particularly successful as the Islanders swept the boards. He was part of Kingussie's 1964 Macaulay Cup winning team.



Norrie Matheson (Kinlochshiel and Lochcarron)

It was with great sadness that the shinty world learned of the passing of Norrie Matheson, a lifelong supporter of the game and a well kent face at shinty venues around the North. Norrie seldom missed a Saturday without taking in a match. Norrie's shinty career started with the Kintail Shinty Club and then after the amalgamation of Kintail, Lochalsh and Glenshiel he went to play for the newly formed Kinlochshiel Club in 1960.

Sandy McKirdy (Bute)

The Isle of Bute and the wider sheep breeding and sheepdog world lost one of its characters, recently, with the death of Sandy McKirdy - he would have been 98 in 2022. A lifelong member of Bute Sheepdog Trials Association and an enthusiastic competitor from 1951, Sandy was a valued and knowledgeable committee member and competitor, continually striving for the wellbeing of the association and made honorary vice-president in 1999 and will be missed by all who knew him on the island.

Roddie Munro (Kilmory & Inveraray)

After a successful playing career with Inveraray (winning the Sutherland Cup) Roddie was instrumental along with a few other key individuals in resurrecting Kilmory Camanachd in 1977. Although a very active Kilmory Committee member Roddie found time to play in goals and defence for the new young team. Roddie also served as club manager for a number of years.

Arlene Porter (Lochaber)

Arlene coached our juniors for a period and had a very positive influence on many of the players that are part of Lochaber's senior teams today, she was popular and committed working tirelessly taking training and organising games contributing massively towards sustaining our club and for that we are all grateful to Arlene. Arlene's family have a massive connection to Lochaber Camanachd, her late uncle Lachie is a former player and Lochaber legend, her brothers Nicky and Martin played, her son Darren and cousins Michael, Cameron, Tyler and Innes all prominent and distinguished current Lochaber players.

Charlie Smith (Fort William)

Charlie was passionate about shinty and if there was a game on at An Aird, he was sure to be there, taking in all the action from the touchline and recounting the match in the Clubhouse afterwards with his friend's whilst enjoying a small aperitif. Charlie was always on hand to volunteer his assistance at An Aird, and he particularly enjoyed encouraging the young ones to pick up their sticks and play.
